

# GWEC-2018 Summary

## Session 1

1. The growth in private sector capabilities and the opportunities coming from PPE means that there needs to be increased clarity on the roles and responsibilities of NMHSs

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2. In general but particularly in developing countries the drivers from NMHSs tend to focus on capital infrastructure first prior to considerations of service delivery. Whereas for users the drivers start with the service provision and that leads to consideration of infrastructure required. This kind of NMHS perspective needs to align more to the service delivery being the main driver.

3. Clarity in the legal and regulatory framework in each country is fundamental to the private sector particularly to facilitate improved PPE.

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4. The enablers of a vibrant PPE also include the need for a more strategic approach to be taken by the public sector as well as making the playing field level if NMHSs venture into offering commercial services . Views expressed that NMHSs should refrain from such competitive behaviour.

5. A range of business models for PPE should be trialed perhaps in developing countries to provide exemplars of what works well and what works less well.
